Ung, Loung *First They Killed My Father: a Daughter of Cambodia Remembers*

Miklowitz, Gloria *The Enemy Has a Face*

Rifa'i, Ainbinder, and Tempel *We Just Want to Live Here: the letters of two teenagers, one Israeli and the other Palestinian.*

Hello, dear Enemy! an exhibition of 100 international children's picture book for peace and tolerance from 55 countries.

*Batezut, Elinor Sisulu *The Day Gogo Went to Vote* - Illustrated in rich pastels, the book provides a child's-eye view of an important milestone in South African history – a black grandmother is allowed to vote.

Leaf, Munro *The Story of Ferdinand*

Scholes, Katherin *Peacetimes*

Dr. Seuss, *Butter Battle Book*

Satrapi, Marjane *Persepolis 1 and 2*

This graphic autobiography caught our interest because of the Iranian background of the author. Iranian discussants assured us that Satrapi's experience was typical of the upper class family in Teheran during the time period she covers. Members commented on the unique experience of "reading" the art as well as the words. It was a novel and powerful experience.

Fadiman, Anne *Spirit Catches You and You Fall Down*

This is the story of a Hmong family with a child who suffers from epilepsy...the medical culture in the US meets medical beliefs and customs of Hmong family. This is a powerful story which is written for adults, not children. However, educators find it particularly

interesting since it tells the heartrending story of a culture clash between well meaning professionals and a family in need. It's possible to have similar situations/conflicts in our schools.

Sharra, Steve. *Fleeing the War*

Written by a LATTICE member, this wonderful book with story and illustrations is not available in the US. Another LATTICE member brought back 20 copies from Malawi last summer.

*Park, Linda Sue. *A Single Shard*

Park's book about Korean celadon pottery and life long ago in Korea is definitely appropriate for 4th graders. There are good websites available for information about celadon pottery, and discussion questions for school readings.

Stephanek, Mattie T.J. *Heartsongs*

Lekuton, Joseph Lemasolai. *Facing the Lion: Growing up Maasai on the African Savanna*

Our Kenyan LATTICE members assure us that this book is accurate. Local educators found the story to be inspirational, informational and amazing.

Osa, Nancy. *Cuba 15*

Cohen, Barbara and Lovejoy, Bahija. *Seven Daughters and Seven Sons*

Ho, Minfong *Clay Marble*

This story about war and the life of refugees in Cambodia led to similar tales from LATTICE members who come from many different parts of the world. Elementary children will find this book captivating and worthy of discussions which will broaden their perspectives.

Sephaniah, Benjamin. *Refugee Boy (Eritrean/Ethiopian refugee to England)*

Here's another take on the life of a refugee. An Ethiopian refugee confirmed that the situation for a child with mixed heritage is accurate but the LATTICE readers questioned the portrayal of the amazing social workers.

Kurtz, Jane. *Jakarta Missing (Third Culture Children)*

"Third Culture" issues kept us talking for hours. Kurtz has captured the dilemma's faced by these children who have lived an infinite variety of situations like this.

Armstrong, Jenifer editor. *Shattered: Stories of Children in War*

These fictional accounts by recognized authors of children's stories offered a number of different points of view as well as different settings of war. Highly recommended.

Peacock, Louise. *Crossing the Delaware*

Written by a LATTICE member, the readers appreciated the history as well as the fiction in this book for elementary and middle school aged children.

Staples, Suzanne Fisher. *Shabanu: Daughter of the Wind*

It's hard to put this book down once you get started on it. A middle school student will certainly get caught up in Shabanu's unique setting and life challenges. However, our Pakistani members helped us to see that the book tells the story through the eyes of a westerner rather than through the eyes of a Pakistani. Students will get the most out of

this read if there are resource people to join them in discussions.

Li Li Jiang, *Red Scarf Girl*

The Cultural Revolution lasted for ten years in the People's Republic of China (PRC). As dramatic and challenging as this period was for everyone in the country, it seemed to us that this story should not be the only one that students read about the PRC. However, when Chinese LATTICE members shared their own family stories about this period and then told us contrasting stories of their lives in the 21st century, they held our attention for hours!

Coerr, Eleanor. *Sadako and the Thousand Cranes*

Our Japanese mentors found a number of aspects of this story for young adults to be lacking in accuracy. First of all, from interviews with Sadako's father, it is clear that the details about Sadako's life are not true. Furthermore, the Japanese do not treat illness in the way that is described in this book. Although it is an inspiring story because the making of the cranes remind us of the universal wish for peace in the midst of terrible stories of war, we decided that Sadako's story is too often used as a reason to make paper cranes rather than as a reason to have deeper discussions about war and conflict resolution.

Gordon, Sheila. *Waiting for Rain*

One LATTICE teacher in a local high school not only taught *Waiting for the Rain* to her students but arranged for her students to correspond with a class of Zulu students in South Africa who had also read this book.

Broker, Ignatia. *Night Flying Woman: An Ojibway Narrative*

Esbensen, Barbara Juster. *Star Maiden: An Ojibway Tale*

Fuller, Alexandra. *Don't Let's Go to the Dog's Tonight*

This adult book is an amazing read. Fuller, born in Rhodesia, takes us through the last forty years with her family. It's a complicated but not flattering story about a kind of "white" family which lived throughout southern Africa.

Hossenei, Khaled. *The Kite Runner* - Setting: Afghanistan and the U.S.

Buck, Pearl S. *The Big Wave* -- Paired with *The Ink Keeper's Apprentice* by Allen Say (a picture book) Setting: Japan

Shihab-Nye, Naomi *Habibi* and *Sitti's Secrets* -- Middle East **Sitti's Secrets* is a picture book that gives a fictionalized account of the author's trip to visit her Palestinian grandmother.

Adichie, Chimamanda Ngozi. *Purple Hibiscus* Setting: Nigeria

The young boy finds some comfort in the beauty of the carpets he is learning to weave. Would be great to use in any lesson about power of art to heal the human spirit.

In the thirteenth century, Sundiata overcame physical handicaps, social disgrace, and strong opposition to rule the West African trading empire of Mali. The illustrations in the book are beautiful.

***Yatandou by Gloria Whelen – Mali**

Yatandou lives in a Mali village with her family and neighbors. And though she is only eight years old and would much rather play with her pet goat, she must sit with the women and pound millet kernels. But as they work, the women dream of a machine that can grind the millet and free them from their pounding sticks. Yatandou must help raise the money, even if it means parting with something she holds dear. Through the eyes and voice of a young girl, award-winning author Gloria Whelen brings to life one village's dream of a better future. Atmospheric paintings from artist Peter Sylvada capture the landscape and spirit of this inspiring story of sacrifice and hope.

***October 28, 2010 Diamond Willow by Helen Frost - Native American** Using diamond-shaped poems inspired by forms found in polished diamond willow sticks, Helen Frost tells the moving story of Willow and her family. Hidden

messages within each diamond carry the reader further, into feelings Willow doesn't reveal even to herself. This book could be used to talk about the connection between art and nature.
